

NOTES ON COMPLETING THE UNDERGRADUATE APPLICATION FORM 2000/2001

NAME Please give your full names. This is important when we come to verify your qualifications.

OCCUPATION It is essential that you complete this section. All our BA, BSc and LLB programmes are for part-time students who are expected to be earning their living in full-time employment. If you are not working outside the home because you are caring for your children or because you have retired or you have long-term health problems, please make this clear (eg. enter 'domestic responsibilities' or 'retired' or 'disabled').

If you are temporarily unemployed, please make it clear that you are seeking a new post. If you are offered an undergraduate place, we will ask you for your job details at enrolment time. (NB. if you are not an EU national, but you are looking for work in the UK, we need to know whether you have permission to take full-time employment here - please make this clear on the application form or in an accompanying letter.)

QUALIFICATIONS Please give the title of your qualifications clearly, especially if they are not UK qualifications, eg. *matura, abitur, baccalauréat, bagrut* etc.

It is important that you give your results as accurately as you can. We do check certificates at enrolment time, but a clear picture now will help the Admissions Tutor give you the best advice at interview.

If you are over 21 years old, we will take into account not only your school examinations, but also your work experience and your performance at interview (and, in some cases, entrance test).

Remember, however, that each degree programme demands particular skills as well as a general aptitude. Check the course description in the prospectus to see what skills are required for your chosen course and make sure that you include details of all your related skills on your application form.

Example: applicants for BSc Psychology need mathematical skills to deal with the large volume of statistical material on the course; the simplest way to prove to the Admissions Tutor that you have that skill is with an O-level or GCSE pass in Mathematics or Statistics, but, if you are over 21, we can accept alternative evidence, such as in-service training courses in statistics. It is most important, therefore, that you enter all relevant skills and training on the application form.

Holders of professional qualifications should give the full title of their qualification and the name of the awarding body.

WORK EXPERIENCE Please include any work experience or in-service training which has developed skills/knowledge relevant to your chosen course. We do not require that your job should be related to your chosen course - a high proportion of our students choose to follow a course completely unrelated to their day-to-day work. Nevertheless, we are interested in any job-related skills which may be relevant to degree studies in general.

OTHER RELEVANT SKILLS AND INTERESTS We suggest you use this space to draw attention to skills or knowledge which you have developed outside work and school. For example, you may have renewed general study skills (note-taking etc) in an adult education course, or gained a working knowledge of another language through regular travel, or you may have had training in connection with voluntary work.

CREDIT FOR EARLIER STUDIES If you already hold a degree (or an approved equivalent) in a subject relevant to the course you now wish to follow and you think that there is sufficient overlap between the two programmes to warrant credits, give a brief account of the syllabus of your first degree and attach a transcript, if possible.

If you started, but did not complete, a degree course elsewhere, we will need to know that your studies were recent enough to be fresh in your mind and sufficiently close to our first-year content to warrant credits. Give a brief outline of your old syllabus and attach official certification from your former university/college. We will also need a reference from your old college, so please give the name of your former Course Tutor or Head of Department, as appropriate.

Our Admissions Tutors will discuss the details of possible credits with you at interview. Any offer of credits is subject to the approval of the College's BA or BSc Degree Committee. If you need further information or advice on credits before you submit your application, please contact Hilary Shahoud in the College Registry on 020 7631 6307.

CLOSING DATES Many courses are oversubscribed. We recommend early application wherever possible.

The main round of admissions interviews is held in late May/early June, so try to get your application to us by the end of April. Admissions Tutors may ask for written work or an entrance test to be completed before interview, so allow time for this when submitting your application.

Most courses have a second round of interviews in September. We ask for applications to reach us by 31 August, but where too many late applications are received, we may have to close the September interview lists earlier in August. This applies particularly to the following courses: LLB, BA English, BA History of Art, BSc Psychology and the interdisciplinary BA in Politics, Philosophy and History.

If you are applying late, it is best to check availability first.

INTERVIEWS As many students as possible will be interviewed and you should receive information about dates of the first round of interviews during May, or in late August for the second round. For further information, please contact the Tutor or the Secretary of the relevant teaching department.

OPEN EVENINGS If you wish to meet the Admissions Tutors or other members of staff to discuss your chosen course, there will be three Open Evenings held in our main Malet Street building: the first on Thursday 24 February 2000, the second on Thursday 4 May 2000, and the third on Tuesday 5 September 2000.
